MEMORANDUM

Complainant, a pro se litigant, complains that the subject United States District Judge and United States Magistrate Judge have unduly delayed completing judicial screening under 28 U.S.C. § 1915(e)(2) in his pending civil rights proceeding. Complainant contends that the delay constitutes "discrimination against me for being poor and unrepresented."

Delays in rendering decisions do not, of themselves, constitute judicial misconduct. There is no evidence to suggest that the delay in judicial screening is due to either lack of diligence or intentional discrimination against an indigent pro se litigant, and the complaint is therefore subject to dismissal under 28 U.S.C. § 352(b)(1)(A)(iii). See Rule 4(b)(2) of the Rules For Judicial-Conduct and Judicial-Disability Proceedings.

An order dismissing the complaint is entered simultaneously herewith.
